CVO Innovations Topic of the Month By: Tamara Chisholm

As part of the calendar of events at CVO, we have a topic of the month. Each week we discuss the topic in various ways whether it be a discussion, a game or activity or maybe a relative activity sheet. The Innovations Department's recent topic was manners.

Listening manners:

Don't talk when someone else is talking. Focus on the person that is talking to you. Give eye contact. Raise your hand to speak. Use whole body listening; meaning ears listening, eyes looking, mouth closed, hands are still, feet are down and still. **Verbal manners:**

We talked the way you should speak to someone: tone, volume, indoor voice versus outdoor voice, words you use, saying please and thank you, and saying excuse me when trying to get someone's attention or when trying to pass by someone. We also discussed that if you can't say something nice about someone don't say anything at all; as well as appropriate topics.

Public Manners:

We reviewed giving someone their own personal space, keeping hands to yourself, burping, passing gas, picking nose, zipper being zipped, covering your nose when sneezing, knock before entering, opening/holding the door for others and even touched on writing thank you notes for gifts.

Table Manners:

For this, we discussed the following: washing hands before meals, place settings, taking small bites, not stuffing your mouth, chewing food, don't talk with food in your mouth, keep mouth and face clean, don't eat with your fingers, don't hunch over your plate, sit up straight, keep elbows off of the table, chew with mouth closed, food to mouth not mouth to food, don't reach across the table, clear your plate from the table, and placing your napkin in your lap.

To practice these various manners, the group went to Parkway House for lunch. It was exciting to see our discussions put into practice; even drawing the attention of our waitress who relayed how impressed she was with the group and how "nice" they were to her. "I was so proud of our group."



After this each person was given a piece of paper torn from the silhouette and told to think of a word or phrase that would hurt their feelings or make them sad. To represent this, they wrinkled the paper inside their hands. After each person had had a chance to do this, the group was told to apologize for the hurtful things they said.

Of course this sounded silly to them but was needed to get the point across. After laughing at how silly they felt we drew attention to the fact that no matter how many times we apologized or told that paper "I'm sorry" it still had wrinkles; scars, if you may. You can rub it and even iron it and possibly remove some of the wrinkles or scars but we were never able to get the paper back to its original condition.; never able to remove a hole. We put the pieces back together, forming the original silhouette but it never will look exactly like it was before.

In just this same way our words can put permanent wrinkles, scars, holes in someone's heart and life that, try as we may, we can never remove.
